Editorial

With Christmas decorations packed away and the rush of celebrations behind us, we move into a new month. February has historically been a cold, dry month but over the last thirty years or so there has been a switch to milder, wetter and sunnier conditions such that it can possibly lay claim to being the first month of Spring rather than the last month of Winter. At the time of writing, we are once again 'enjoying' a period of mild and very wet weather and no doubt the first welcome signs of colour in our gardens and hedgerows will soon be seen in the form of snowdrops, crocus and daffodils. The highest UK maximum temperature recorded during February was as recently as 2019 when Kew saw a high of 21.2C, the lowest being somewhat further back in 1955 when Braemar suffered a cool -25C. We too remember the 'Beast from the East' which affected much of Europe in February 2018 and as this month's Full Moon is known as the 'Snow Moon' perhaps we should be prepared for anything that nature throws at us.

February 2nd is Groundhog Day when our colonial cousins in Punxsutawney in Pennsylvania drag out a hibernating rodent (these days one kept in captivity) to predict the weather for the remaining Winter period. If the animal sees his shadow, there will be six more weeks of winter to



come.....and 85% of the time he sees such a shadow. This is not surprising as that part of the US tends to enjoy stable atmospheric conditions resulting in sunny and cold days prevailing.

The first week of this month also sees the culmination of the Chinese New Year celebrations, this year being the Year of the Rabbit.

February 22nd also marks the anniversary of the last time that foreign forces invaded British soil, an event that seems to have evaded my history books. It lasted a brief two days in 1797. Whilst Napoleon was busy elsewhere in Europe. A rag-tag French force of some 1,000 was aiming to land at Bristol but weather conditions meant that landfall was ultimately made near Fishguard in West Wales. The invaders went into

neighbouring villages in the area, forgot the purpose of their mission, and soon took advantage of stocks of alcohol which came from a recently shipwrecked Portuguese boat, giving time for a small garrison force to be augmented by local workers who quickly rounded up the drunken invaders in the Battle of Fishguard.

A local hero was one Jemima Nicholas who gathered together a group of women to face the enemy wearing traditional red Welsh Dress. She also single-handedly rounded up twelve of the invaders and locked them in a local church. Her efforts earned her a pension of £50 per year which she drew until her death in 1832.

Government Emergency Alert system soon to go live.

The UK government's new Emergency Alerts system will be live early this year, and you should expect to receive a test message. The system will enable people to be contacted via their mobile phone when lives are in danger. It will be used to warn you in the event of emergencies, such as severe flooding. Emergency Alerts are sent to all compatible mobile phones within an area of risk. They don't track your location, need your phone number, or collect personal data. Only the government and the emergency services will be able to send them. If you don't have a mobile phone, you'll still be informed through other channels. If you get an Emergency Alert on your phone, you'll hear a loud, siren-like sound. A message on your screen will tell you about the emergency and how best to respond. You'll be able to check an alert is genuine at gov.uk/alerts. If you receive an alert, read the alert carefully and follow the instructions. You can opt out of receiving emergency alerts; for more information on how to opt out please go to gov.uk/alerts. Find out more about Emergency Alerts here.

Dear Friends,

Candlemas falls on 2nd February. Along with blessing the candles in church, it is also when we commemorate the Presentation of Christ in the Temple; revisiting the encounter of Simeon and Anna with the infant Jesus, the one for whom they have been waiting patiently and faithfully, a light to lighten the Gentiles, the Light of the world. By the time you read this we will already have celebrated Candlemas (on 29th January, the nearest Sunday before). This marks the end of the season of feasting which began at Christmas and is the moment when we pause to look back at the wonder and glory of Christmas before turning our attention towards Lent.

This year Ash Wednesday falls on 22nd February and so begins the

season of Lent, when we follow in the way of the adult Jesus, a way which will take us to the foot of the Cross. But we begin, on the first Sunday of Lent, in the wilderness. Do we see this as something negative, a barren place of desolation? Or might we see it as an opportunity to come closer to God, to be refreshed?

Horatius Bonar (C19th Scottish priestpoet and hymn writer), concerned about what he perceived as a reticence among church folk to make time to pray, wrote this:

"In one single quiet hour of prayer [the soul] will often make more progress than in days of company with others. It is in the desert that dew falls freshest



and the air is purest. So with the soul. It is when none but God is nigh; when his presence alone, like the desert air in which there is mingled no noxious breath of man, surrounds and pervades the soul; it is then that the eye gets the clearest, simplest view of eternal certainties; it is then that the soul gathers in wondrous refreshment and power and energy."


And lest you are tempted to think this is an exercise in navel gazing, Bonar concludes:

"And so it is also in this way that we become truly useful to others. It is when coming out fresh from communication with God that we go forth to do His work successfully."

Horatius Bonar is probably best known for his hymn 'I heard the voice of Jesus say'. It is a favourite of mine and I commend it to you. May you find rest, refreshment and time to pray this Lent.

The Night Sky in February

The cold clear nights of Winter provide ample opportunities for sky watching - at a reasonable hour - and there is plenty to see this month. The gas giant Jupiter has dominated the skies since September and whilst its brilliance is diminishing, it continues to illuminate the southern sky, riding pretty high now until it sets at around 19.00h towards month's end. It will shortly disappear from our evening skies before reappearing in September. Jupiter's dominance is replaced during the month by the brilliant light of Venus, visible just after sunset in the western sky. A particularly good view of both planets should be available at around 19.00h on 22 February low in the western sky when the thin crescent Moon will lie between them. Should observing conditions not be good, the following evening will find Jupiter below the Moon with Venus a little lower towards the horizon.

Venus will also provide a good opportunity to identify faint Neptune on the evening of 15 February again at round 19.00, low in the western sky, though binoculars or a small telescope will be needed. Neptune is normally very difficult to see (it is the outermost planet in our system) but its proximity to Venus provides a rare opportunity to take a look as it will be just below and to the right of our neighbouring planet.


Mars has been a very visible feature of our evening skies in recent months identifiable with its reddish tinge. It is beginning to fade, though

remains visible high towards the west until setting around 03.00h. On 28 February after midnight Mars will be found sitting immediately above the Moon low in the western sky.

Even lower in the sky and to the left will be Betelgeuse, one of the stars of the constellation of Orion and which also displays a roddish tingo

What we've been doing in the last month

At the end of last year, we completed our budget setting process for 2023/24. As a council we worked hard to identify savings where possible. We are happy to report that our precept request has not increased from last year.

We've made a couple of changes to our website to hopefully make it easier to find the important information, we have added two new tabs Council Meeting Documents - Calne Without Parish Council (calnewithout-pc.gov.uk) and Parish Council Documents - Calne Without Parish Council (calnewithout-pc.gov.uk) The first tab lists all of our meeting dates and provides all the associated documents, the second tab lists all the up to date procedures and policies, including our grant application policies. We hope these two changes make it easier to find what you need to know.

2023 Meeting Dates

As a Parish Council we meet on the Second Monday of the month and our meetings are held at the Lansdowne Hall, Derry Hill. The meetings are public meetings and members of the public are welcome to come and observe the meetings, there is a section for public participation at the start of each meeting.

Due to bank holidays the April 23 and May 23 meetings have been moved to the third Monday of the month.

Thermal imaging Camera Scheme

Over this winter, the Parish Council is running a free thermal imaging camera loan scheme. At the time of writing, we have completed loans to 25 households, helping residents of Calne Without to identify where their homes are losing valuable heat.

Wiltshire Residents urged to report issues through Wiltshire Council's updated app

Wiltshire Council has released an updated version of its smartphone app, MyWilts, and is reminding residents that it is the quickest and easiest way to report issues such as road defects, fly-tipping, trading standards issues and more.

The MyWilts app is available for <u>Apple</u> or <u>Android</u> devices and is also accessible through the Wiltshire Council website. This updated version



offers improvements such as upgraded mapping technology for street scene and enforcement reports, plus improved email communication, so that people can receive more updates about their report.

Current app users are advised to update their app through the Apple App Store or Google Play as soon as they can; while anyone who downloads the app for the first time will automatically receive the new and improved version. On Apple devices, the minimum iOS version required is 12.0; while on Android devices, people must be using version 7.0 or above.

Cllr Ashley O'Neill, Cabinet Member for Digital, said: "The MyWilts app is the quickest and easiest way for people to let us know about any issues they see while out and about in Wiltshire.

"People can use the app to let us know about issues such as road defects, fraud, fly-tipping and abandoned vehicles – and much more.

"This updated version also offers improved maps, so people can more accurately plot where any issues are, making it easier for our teams to find the reports. Also improved is the email communication, so when people let us know about an issue, they will receive more regular updates on the progress of their report.

Updating our Neighbourhood Plan: what's been happening?

Protecting our treasured 'Local Green Spaces'

We have been looking for opportunities to protect the green spaces which we all love, which give us room to breathe and get closer to nature, as well as somewhere to play or walk the dog.

The response to our survey was great and so many of you supported designating your local green spaces as part of the plan.

There are strict criteria for designation and we are currently hoping to include 28 in the revised plan. They range from small spaces with historic tree lines, such as the Calne Promenade near Holy Trinity Church and school, to the larger Castlefield Country Park, which includes the cycle path, the River Marden and open countryside close to the centre of town.

The support from landowners has generally been good, although there are some issues to resolve. We will keep you up to date as we progress this work.

A New Year's resolution?



A man's guide to eating to get ripped.

Sparta's economy relied on farming and conquering other peoples because they didn't have enough land to feed their own population, and they used captive slaves to do the work.

Perhaps we should think again before trying to copy the Spartans as a new year's resolution!

At the age of four Amelie Smith was fascinated by the sound of performers' feet on stage at the Chippenham Folk Festival. When the stage wasn't being used, she hopped up and tried it out for herself. Her mum, Kathryn. says that was the start of her desire to tap dance and be on stage. She seemed to



develop her innate ability to keep rhythm. Having seen a show at the Wyvern in Swindon when she was five, she was further inspired and this led to her going to Tap Attack in Swindon, which is the centre for tap dancing in Great Britain.

Amelie also travels down for a week-long training sessions at Stagebox in London four times a year to develop her acting and singing skills. Kathryn adds that Amelie takes singing lessons from the "incredible" Lisa House from Derry Hill.


At Derry Hill school she played Wendy in the Peter Pan production recently and has now moved on to Sheldon School, who are very

supportive when she has to take time out to go to competitions. Amelie is a very active young lady; her mum says she is always on the go and attends twelve activities a week!

In June last year she competed in the International Dance Organisation's European Tap Championships in Prague, where she won the silver in the Children's Solo female category representing Team GB.

In November 2022 she was again in action at the IDO World Tap Championships in

Croatia and was crowned the Children's Solo Female World Champion.



Only the second British girl to win this category! At the same event she won silver with her children's group and sixth with her duo partner.

Amelie's mother, Kathryn and her father Chris, are quite overwhelmed with the success their daughter has achieved, getting to her goal in three years. "It's terrifying as parents to watch. You are completely powerless to help your child in that moment. She was up on the world stage and danced like a dream," said Kathryn.

Crime and incident updates

On 29/12/2022 12:15hrs a black Mercedes was stopped on the A361 near to Derry Hill. Upon officers conferring with the driver, they smelt the scent of cannabis emitting from within the vehicle. The officers conducted a search of the vehicle where a small amount of cannabis was located. The driver has been advised to attend a police station to be interviewed regarding this matter.

On 16/01/2023 02:40hrs, a black Renault Megane was stopped by officers on the A361 near to Derry Hill for showing no insurance. The vehicle was seized and recovered. The driver has been reported for that offence, and for the offence of having a tyre under the legal required limit.

On 14/01/2023 04:15hrs, police attended a report of a vehicle collision in Hazeland, Bremhill. Upon officers arriving at the location, they found a blue ford Fiesta which had left the road and collided with a garage. One passenger in the vehicle suffered very minor injuries. The driver was not injured.

Speeding

We have recently received a few reports of vehicles travelling at excessive speeds through the village.

Due to the concerns raised, we will be conducting speed checks and taking any enforcement action required in the area over the next few weeks.

Driving in adverse weather conditions

We are responding to ever higher numbers of vehicle collisions during this time of year.

We urge drivers to take extra care on the roads around Wiltshire, with ice, snow and flooding in some areas leading to hazardous conditions.

Please avoid unnecessary journeys and if you must drive, reduce your speed - it can take 10 times longer to stop in icy conditions, and do not attempt to drive through deep flooded routes.



Always ensure all windows, any snow-covered surfaces are clear before moving off.



Nearly Nuclear Armageddon in Bremhill and Derry Hill - Convair B36 crash



70 years ago, in February 1953 people were still talking about the floods in the East of England when the North Sea storms had broken through the dykes and hundreds of people had been killed and even a submarine and naval ship had sunk in Sheerness dockyard. For me February 5th was a great day as the rationing of sweets introduced during WW2 finished. For my Dad, he was pleased that petrol had also become more plentiful with the ending of pool petrol earlier in the week.


On 7th February people in Bremhill and Derry hill were going about their normal early Saturday morning routine on what was a rather wet and foggy day when just after breakfast time the rumble and roar of a massive aeroplane passing very low overhead caused many villagers to look up and wonder why it was so low. Mr J P Hollick who lived at Pitters Farm along Sandy Lane thought that it might be on fire inside with a bright glow piercing through the gloom. A few moments after passing. A few moments after passing overhead a loud thump was heard which resounded across the hills of the parish as the aircraft crashed, disintegrated and caught fire in Nethermore Woods. Just lower down, the north side of the hill, than the current mobile phone masts which are clearly visible. Looking at a Google satellite view you can today clearly see the neat rows of tree planting which took place after the crash to replace the destroyed trees and resultant fires.



The aircraft was a top secret American 10 engine nuclear bomber, 6 propellers facing backwards and 4 jet engines, a Convair B36 peacemaker number 51-5719 of the 492 Sqn of the 7th bomber wing of the USAF. At the time the largest bomber in service anywhere in the world, which had just flown across the Atlantic via Goose Bay, Newfoundland from its base at Carswell, located North-West of Fort Worth Texas on a training flight to RAF Fairford with 15 other B36 bombers. The crew, under the command of Lt. Col Herman Gerick, a WW2 veteran but still only 34 years old, all bailed out and survived. It was stated at the time that the aircraft was low on fuel and could not get permission to land therefore the decision was made to leave the aircraft. Later, on 11 December 1953, another Convair B36 again under the command of Lt. Col Gerick crashed at 7000 feet on Mount Franklin, El Paso Texas with the loss of all the airmen on board. At the board of enquiry pilot error was given as the cause of the crash.

Back to the crash at Nethermore Woods, the press association released a short statement to say an aircraft had crashed near Lacock and this appeared in several newspapers as a brief note. Nothing appeared in any of our local newspapers until 2 weeks later a reader's letter to the Gazette and Herald asked why did the crew bail out and leave the massive bomber to fly another 30 miles unattended. Clearly it could have resulted in a major loss of life had it landed in a large village or town. The Gazette did write an article 20 years ago on the 50th anniversary - a bit late.

The mystery deepens as I have been unable to find any official recognition of the incident or crash enquiry reports either here or in the USA apart from a 1953 Texas newspaper article saying that



unusual secrecy surrounded the crash. The crew were apparently told not to discuss the crash.

I have no proof apart from that of omission and can only surmise that the aircraft carried a thermonuclear weapon at the time and it was decided to keep all news of this all under wraps so as not to alarm the British public. Several other B36 incidents involved thermonuclear weapons but they were all ditched at sea - maybe!



In February we will experience 'A Right Royal Evening!'. Wonder what this could be - we will have to wait to find out...






